MEASURING THE IMPACT OF THE PUPIL PREMIUM SPEND IN 2018 - 2019

The school analyses and evaluates whole school data as part of progress meetings, ensuring intervention and provision are of high priority for the Pupil Premium pupils.

Working with the school SIP I have used past PUMA and PIRA results to formulate a method of showing progress on available data.

SATs results to be published will allow me to chart progress from starting points.

School is in the process of developing a system which will allow accurate tracking of all pupils.

Data analysis across the school shows that our approaches to Pupil Premium and provision / programmes are having some impact in certain year groups.

Our disadvantaged pupils are priority across school, in all subjects, and we continually monitor, evaluate and develop our approach and programme to ensure we are providing the best for all our pupils.

Methodology

From KS1 SATs results (old levels e.g. 2A, 2B etc) 2A=17, 2B=15 etc R, W, M

(R+W/2) +M this gives and APS score which is then converted to a PAG score (Prior Attainment Score) That then defines the expected scores for a child in RWM in Year 6.
Using PUMA and PIRA date for Spring you can compare point scores to give a forecast.

So, taking 100 as the expectation

Puma 19 PP Children with 100+ PUMA scores. 9 more had scores of 90+

Pira 21 PP Children with 100+ PIRA scores. 9 more had scores of 90+

Progress of SEND/PP Children

Year1 100% progress in S&L, R and W 80% in Maths

Year 2 S&L 83% R and W 100% No maths children for both criteria.

Year3 100% progress in S&L, R and W 50% in Maths

Year4 50% S&L, 100% in R and 75% in writing. 60% in Maths

Year 5 100% progress in S&L, R and W Maths shows little progress for 3 children 60%

Year 6 100% progress in S&L, R. W=80% Maths shows little progress for 7 children 78%
